Andrew has been awarded grant funding from Cancer Research UK, Medical Research Council, Wellcome Trust, Illumina UK, Cancer Research UK, Mason Medical Research Foundation, Peel Medical Research Trust & St Georges Hospital Charity.

His current research programme is examining the molecular genetics of colorectal cancer, and has recently received programme funding from CRUK to set up organoid model systems to understand neoadjuvant chemoradiosensitivity in rectal cancer. He is also carrying out research into rare cancers using multi-omics profiling; biomarker development technologies and runs a bioinformatics "dry-lab" to search for novel therapeutic targets and stratification markers.




Dr Osvaldo Borelli Consultant Paediatric Gastroenterologist



The New BSG Covid 2020 guidance on the 'no-biopsy' diagnosis was published in June 2020, Scottish work helping to advise on the practicality of that and contemporaneous with an all of Scotland project on its applicability in adult practice across different centres.

The Coeliac WG presentation aims to highlight key aspects of CD care and highlight important areas where BSPGHAN and CUK can provide evidence based, but yet practical management peri- and post-diagnosis.

Professor Gordon is a consultant Paediatrician working in the North West of the UK. Clinically, he worked in acute paediatrics for 19 years until



Her research has led to centralisation of care for children with biliary atresia; improvements in therapy for viral hepatitis in children and the quality and outcome of life following liver and/or intestinal transplantation. She has initiated international research into graft outcomes post-transplant (Graft Injury Group)

She has been President of the European Society of Paediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition (ESPGHAN) (2006-2010), British Society for Paediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition (BSPGHAN) (2004-2007) and the International Pediatric Transplant Association (IPTA) (2002-2005).

Professor Kelly is author of several textbooks about paediatric liver disease and has published many original articles and chapters on liver disease, liver transplantation and viral hepatitis. She is deputy Editor of Liver Transplantation (2015-).




Ms Annette Mulcahy
